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explores some of the processes of categorizing the disabled through a study of 194 physically impaired people and considers the problems of categorization from the disabled person's perspective

the study of disability has traditionally been influenced mainly by medical and psychological models the aim of this new text disability and society is to open up the debate by introducing alternative perspectives reflecting the increasing sociological interest in this important topic disability and society brings together for the first time some of the most recent original research in this rapidly expanding area the contributors both disabled and non disabled are all leading thinkers in their field and suggest new ways of understanding disability developing policy and challenging current practice

presents current knowledge of and experience with disability across a wide variety of

places conditions and cultures to both the general reader and the specialist

this is the first book on working with disabled people to take an aspirational outcomes focused approach to professional practice it forms the first attempt to grapple with the massive legislative and policy shifts in the disability field in the last 15 years and provides an up to date positive approach to professional practice based on the social model of disability the text translates both adult and childrens disability legislation and policy guidance into positive creative enabling practice methods for professionals in social care health employment and independent living the book takes a practical approach that challenges professionals to confront key issues in disability studies policy and practice the key topics covered are the historical legacy legislation policy and guidance community care and beyond pivotal moments in the development of disability policy independent living choices and rights life course issues valuing diversity and key challenges for an aspiring social model practitioner this book is an indispensable resource for all professionals and students working with disabled people

this book explores the series of issues that emerge at the intersection of disability care and family law disability studies is an area of increasing academic interest in addition to a subject in its own right there has been growing concern to ensure that mainstream subjects diversify and include marginalised voices including those of disabled people family law in modern times is often based on an able bodied autonomous norm but can fit less well with the complexities of living with disability in response this book addresses a range of important and highly topical issues whether care proceedings are used too often in cases where parents have disabilities how the law should respond to children who care for disabled parents and the care of older family members with disabilities it also considers the challenges posed by the un convention on the rights of persons with disabilities particularly around the different institutional and state responsibilities captured in the convention and around decision making for both disabled adults and children this interdisciplinary collection with contributors from law criminology sociology and social policy as well as from policy and activist backgrounds will appeal to academic family lawyers and disability scholars as well as students interested in issues around family law disability and care

disability and the life course first published in 2001 explores the global experience of disability using a novel life course approach the book explores how disabling societies impact on disabled people s life experiences and highlights the ways in which disabled people have acted to take more control over their own lives it provides a unique combination of analysis policy issues and autobiography offering the reader a rare opportunity to make links between the theoretical the political and the personal in a

single volume the material is set in a truly international context with contributions from thirteen different countries bringing together established and emerging writers both disabled and non disabled the book bridges some important gaps in the existing disability literature by including issues relevant to disabled people of all ages and with different kinds of impairments and also by offering a unique analysis of the relationship between disability and generation in a changing world

disability studies has become a legitimate area of academic study it is multi disciplinary in its critique of the oppressions that have historically dumped disabled people on the margins of society this fully revised and updated edition not only explains disability studies as an academic field of inquiry it also explores many of the current issues affecting the lives and circumstances of disabled people the book explores and analyzes quality of life factors in the lives of disabled people in relation to the professional development of undergraduates and examines the emergence of rights for disabled people in the local area the uk and abroad the author indicates the strengths and weaknesses of organizations of and for disabled people and provides examples of individual and institutional oppressions against disabled people and success stories exploring how these have been overcome in education and employment the book

suggests how disabled and non disabled people can collaborate in the development of inclusive communities and neighborhoods the text is suitable for students taking courses in the areas of health social care and allied services at nvq btec degree and pgce level the author encourages students to raise their own questions and develop their own forms of inquiry

why has the discursive turn been sidelined in the development of a social theory of disability and what has been the result of this how might a social theory of disability which fully incorporates the multidimensional and multifunctional role of language be described what would such a theory contribute to a more inclusive understanding of discourse and culture the idea that disability is socially created has in recent years been increasingly legitimated within social cultural and policy frameworks and structures which view disability as a form of social oppression however the materialist emphasis of these frameworks and structures has sidelined the growing recognition of the central role of language in social phenomena which has accompanied the linguistic turn in social theory as a result little attention has been paid within disability studies to analysing the role of language in struggle and transformation in power relations and the engineering of social and cultural change drawing upon personal narratives rhetoric material discourse discourse analysis cultural representation ethnography and contextual studies international contributors seek to emphasize the multi dimensional and multi functional nature of disability language in an attempt to further inform our understanding of disability and to locate disability more firmly within contemporary mainstream social and cultural theory

this book is about being disabled and being poor and the social cultural and political processes that link these two aspects of living in what has been characterised as a vicious circle yeo moore 2003 it is also about the strengths that people show when living with disability and being poor how they try to overcome their problems and making the best out of what little they have this book will appeal to academics postgraduates and policymakers in disability studies development studies poverty and social exclusion

focusing on contemporary childhood disability issues and relevant to the lived experiences of disabled children and young people and their families this book addresses themes such as transition identity education inclusion and service provision it also includes insightful contributions on participatory research and practice with disabled children and young people including an emphasis on capability voice and communicative spaces for those with life limiting and more severe levels of impairment the contributions to this book are grounded in a commitment to the rights of disabled children and young people as explicitly recognised under the united nations conventions on the rights of the child 1989 and rights of persons with disabilities 2006 however the authors also draw our attention to the detrimental impact of economic austerity and conflict on the extent to which these rights are being realised encouraging further consideration of issues relating to social justice inter dependence and participation

addressing the diversity of disabled children's lives across service domains and international contexts this book provides an evidence base to support the realisation of the rights of disabled children and young people this book was originally published as a special issue of *Child Care in Practice*

anne borsay explores experiences of physical and mental impairment in Britain since the industrial revolution covering such topics as the exclusion of disabled people from the full rights of citizenship because of their marginality to the labour market institutional living and community care

in an era of scarce social resources the question of the changing social policy constructions and responses to disabled people has become increasingly important paradoxically some disabled people are realising new freedoms and choices never before envisioned whilst others are prey to major retractions in public services and aggressive attempts to redefine who counts as genuinely disabled understanding disability policy locates disability policy into broader social policy and welfare policy writings and goes beyond narrow statutory evaluations of welfare to embrace a range of indicators of disabled people's welfare the book critically explores the roles of social security social support poverty socio economic status community safety official discourses and spatial change in shaping disabled people's opportunities it also situates welfare and disability policy in the broader conceptual shifts to the social model of disability and its critics finally it explores the possible connection between changing official and academic constructions of disability and their implications for social policy in the 21st century the book is supported by a companion website containing additional materials for both students and lecturers using the book which is available from the link above

examines the role of the law in combatting disability discrimination in the labour market and in promoting the employment rights of disabled workers
